Officers of the Gananoque Police Service investigated 55 occurrences during the seven day period ending October 30<sup>th</sup>, 2011. This included 13 criminal occurrences, 2 motor vehicle collision, 5 calls to 911 for assistance, 6 Provincial Offense Notices.

### **October 24<sup>th</sup>, 2011**

Officers received information regarding a theft and an attempted theft of lawnmowers. One complainant reports chaining and locking her lawnmower and gas can but then finding the chain, lock and gas can missing. This is the second report of a stolen lawnmower between the dates of October 10<sup>th</sup> to October 20<sup>th</sup>.

### **October 24<sup>th</sup>, 2011**

Officer responded to a 911 call requesting police and ambulance as someone had been hit by a vehicle in a local business's parking lot. The 47 year old male was taken by ambulance to the Kingston General Hospital and was treated for his injuries and released. Upon further investigation a 53 year old female driver was placed under arrest and charged with Dangerous Operation Causing Bodily Harm – Motor Vehicle, Assault with a Weapon, Utter Threat to Cause Harm or Death and Possession Schedule II Substance. The Female was held for a bail hearing. The Gananoque Police are continuing their investigation and asking any witnesses to contact the Gananoque Police Service.

### **October 27<sup>th</sup>, 2011**

The Gananoque Police received a complaint of an assault. Investigation revealed the incident was domestic in nature and arrested and charged a 18 year old female with assault. The female was released on a Promise to Appear and Undertaking before an officer in charge on conditions to appear in court on a later date.

### **October 28<sup>th</sup>, 2011**

Officers were advised of a theft at a local King Street business at approximately 3:30pm that day. Suspect was identified and issued a trespass notice to not attend the business further on.

### **October 29<sup>th</sup>, 2011**

Officers received a 911 call reporting a mischief that had occurred at a Stone Street residence. Officers spoke with residents who advised the 50 year old female had threatened the occupants and broken a window. The Female later turned herself in to the station and was charged with Utter Threats to Cause Death and released on a Promise to Appear and Undertaking before an Officer in Charge.

### **October 29<sup>th</sup>, 2011**

In the early morning hours a male attended the station requesting to speak to an officer. Male was visibly intoxicated and became agitated and threatened officers. Male was placed under arrest for Public Intoxication and lodged in cells. Male remained agitated and was transported to Kingston General Hospital by ambulance for his own safety. Male refused psychiatric treatment and was returned to the station and later released with a Province Offense Notice for Public Intoxication under the Liquor License Act.

### **October 29<sup>th</sup>, 2011**

Officers received a 911 call regarding a missing 48 year male from a Birch Street residence. Officers patrolled area and located the male. The male was returned to the care of his family.

Bullying in local schools has been prevalent but more so with the uprise of social media such as Facebook and Twitter as well as the freedom of cellphone usage. It is easier than ever for bullies to harass their victims and it makes it more difficult for victims to get away from their assailants.
